


*The Legend of La Befana* originates from a tale about the Three Wise Men on the way to Bethlehem bearing gifts for the Christ child who stop at the house of an old woman for directions and ask her to join them. But she cannot because she is too busy. Later that night she decides to follow them but cannot find her way. She is believed to be searching for the baby as she brings presents and treats to the children of Italy.

On January 5<sup>th</sup>, the children of Italy go to bed hoping the kindly old woman they call "*La Befana*" will visit them with presents and treats for those who have been good. Or a lump of coal for these who have not. The children hang their stockings on the evening of January 5<sup>th</sup> and check them the next morning to see if La Befana has visited them.

## "THE TRADITION OF BABBO NATALE"

Italians have a strong link to Christmas traditions, with a presepio in front of every church and government office, decorated Christmas trees and decorations in cities, towns and villages across Italy. The feast of the Epiphany is celebrated on January 6th and is a national holiday in Italy.

*Babbo Natale* (Father Christmas), Italy's version of Santa Claus, is a popular gift giver on Christmas Day. Todays *Babbo Natale* and Santa Claus have their roots in an Italian Saint. Saint Nicholas, known in Italy as San Nicola di Bari, is one of the most popular saints in Western Europe and is known for his gift giving and protection of children.

La Befana, the old woman who delivers gifts on the Epiphany on January 6 is still the more popular Italian Christmas figure.
